- CHARM-EU's work on inclusion was recognised by <u>COFACE Families Europe | CHARM-EU</u>.





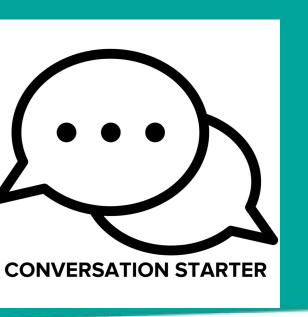
